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Antimicrobial Resistance from a One Health Lens: A South African Scenario

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Summary:

The growing threat of antimicrobial resistance (AMR) on human, animal and environmental health is worrisome and needs careful attention. If not properly handled, humanity is set to face a more deadly pandemic requiring more complex remedial actions. As such, the highly advocated One Health approach requires concerted efforts led by scientific evidence to achieve universal success in the fight against AMR. Although this approach is implemented with success in some settings, it is not always the case in others, especially where technological and financial barriers exist. Thus, this presentation will focus on some results of studies conducted in South Africa on AMR using the one health approach and will identify gaps and areas for improvement.

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
